FEBRUARY 7, 1935 COUNTY BOARD TO JOIN FIGHT ON BILLBOARDS

Supervisors Plan to Send Request to Legislature for Definite Action

County Officials Feel That Case is of Territory-wide Importance

Getting behind the Hilo Woman's club's drive to eliminate billboard advertising, the board of supervisors at its meeting yesterday afternoon voted to instruct the county attorney to prepare a suitable resolution memorializing the legislature to pass an ordinance prohibiting such advertising.

This action was taken by the board following receipt of a letter from the Woman's club in which the board was urged to aid the club in its efforts to preserve the natural beauties of the islands by eliminating all bill board and street banner advertising.

MARCH 14, 1935 D, TRIBUNE HERALD AGE LIMIT IN LIQUOR STATUTE BACKED BY CLUB

Woman's Club to Petition Legislature to Support Liquor Regulations

Supporting the legislation limiting the hours of employment and ages of girls working in beer halls, and also limiting the number of liquor licenses issued by the liquor commission, the Hilo Woman's club voted to petition the legislature on these matters, at its meeting yesterday afternoon at the First Foreign church social hall.

Beautification

1931: Planted memorial trees back of Federal Building.

Sponsored the collection of money to develop Liliuokalani Park into a Japanese Garden - Donated the Japanese Pagoda at a cost of \$350.00.

1932: Planted coconut trees & hibiscus at Hooluu Park/stables and Kuhio Wharf, and shrubs along Wailuku River bank above bridge.

1934: Planted areca palms and other plantings on drive to old Hilo Hospital, Cannas and hibiscus at Rainbow Falls, and Ginger and shrubs at Pukihae Gulch and Wainaku Avenue.

1935: Instrumental in establishing measurements for billboard signs. (Absence of billboards still today.)

Petitioned for age limit liquor statute.

1940: Petitioned for the enactment of an ordinance on measurement, color and height of "For Sale" property signs.

1941: Beautification of Mooheau Park, shower trees planted in Waiakea Homestead.

1943: Stopped indiscriminate issuance of licenses in licensing liquor bars.

1945: Sidewalk ordinance - compelling property owners to clean land between sidewalk and curb.

Implemented a campaign to rid town of stray dogs left by departing soldiers.

1949: Landscaped around the Board of Health building.

Education, Culture and Arts

1931: Sponsored Women's Chorus for Hilo and bought a collection of songs.

Compiled a total of 100 marker signs depicting points/places of interest on the island for the Hawaii Visitors Bureau which after reviewing selected 25 for immediate use.

Presented minstrel shows to raise funds to finance community activities of the club.

1935: Minstrel Show "Four and Twenty Blackbirds" benefiting the Hilo Baby Clinic.

1940: Sponsored lecture by Dr. Peter Buck and other speakers to date.

1949: Sent one dozen leis each week to Hawaiian Exhibit at the Rockefeller Center in New York at a cost of \$200.31.

Health & Welfare

1930: Advocated and worked for the enlargement of Puumaile Home (co-sponsored by Rotary Club of Hilo.)

1931: Compiled scrapbooks on science, sports, and short stories for Puumaile Home.

1932: Spearheaded the formation of the local branch of the Tuberculosis Society (with other orgs)

1935: Paid a year's rent for the Baby Clinic quarters located on Keawe Street.

1942: Sent flowers to graves of soldiers on Memorial Day and to each soldier's funeral in Hilo; and wrote letters to mothers of the boys and took pictures of graves to send to families.

1945: Resolution favoring the meat inspection ordinance put into effect immediately.

Wrote letters to both houses of the legislature that the Nutrition Program be transferred to the Territory from the TB Assoc.

Recreation

1931: Sponsored and funded summer recreation programs of the County

1942: Decorated the recreation room of the army located at the airport.

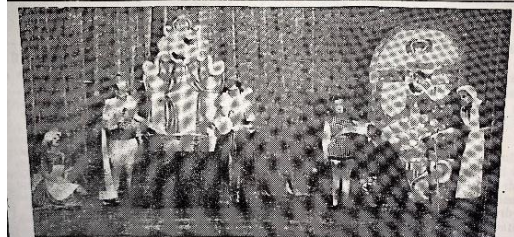
POSTERS FOR TOBACCO ARE PAU FOR HILO
